# State Budget

- > GOVERNOR CHRISTIE DELIVERED HIS PROPOSED BUDGET ON FEBRUARY 28.

### **Municipal Property Tax Relief Funding**

(or what they call "State Aid")

- \$35.5 BILLION STATE BUDGET FOR FISCAL YEAR (FY) 2018.
- > "MUNICIPAL AID,"
  - b the overall funding will remain flat at \$1.5 billion,
  - > slight increase in the Consolidated Municipal Property Tax Relief Act (CMPTRA)
  - > slight decrease in "transitional aid," down to approximately \$93 million.

  - Distribution Schedule?
- APPLICATIONS FOR CALENDAR YEAR MUNICIPALITIES SEEKING TRANSITIONAL AID WILL BE DUE IN MARCH; FISCAL MUNICIPALITIES MAY APPLY IN THE FALL.

### **Municipal Property Tax Relief Funding**

(or what they call "State Aid")



- Sovernor will have contributed \$8.8 billion over his 2 terms.
- > FY 2018 PROJECTED REVENUES \$1.2 BILLION,
  - > 3.65% Increase
  - > 75% to 78% will be directed towards pension and health benefits.

#### MUNICIPALITIES IN THE STATE HEALTH BENEFITS PLAN ACHIEVED SIGNIFICANT SAVINGS

- > resulting from the plan design reforms during FY 2017 budget.
- > Such savings have not been replicated for the school education health plan.

### **Municipal Property Tax Relief Funding**

- > ON FEBRUARY 26, THE DCA/DLGS POSTED THE CY 2016/SFY 2017 PROPERTY TAX RELIEF CERTIFICATIONS.
- > MUNICIPALITIES MUST OBTAIN THEIR CERTIFICATION THROUGH THE WEBSITE. THEY WILL NOT BE MAILED.


# Budget Projections

#### > PROPOSED BUDGET ASSUMES:

- > 3.65% Revenue Growth
- > \$125 Million in Savings, Due to Public Employee Health Benefit Reforms.

# What is "Level Funding"

- ➤ Level since FY 2011.
- > FY 2011 "level funding" was less than FY 2010, which was lower than FY 2009, which was lower than FY 2008.
- > Total loss of \$320 million.
- > Total inflation FY 2011: 11%

### **Transportation Trust Fund**

- > SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATION FOR CURRENT BUDGET (FY 2017) OF \$400 MILLION FOR MUNICIPALITIES, COUNTIES AND NJ TRANSIT.
  - Unclear as to how this will be distributed
- > NEW TTF LAW CALLS FOR \$400 MILLION APPROPRIATION IN FY 2018,
  - > Municipal share, per statute, would be just under half.
  - > Gas Tax revenues constitutionally dedicated for transportation.

# Pension and Health Benefits Lottery To Fund Pensions

- Contribute the Revenue from Lottery to Eligible Pension Plans
- > Immediate effect of
  - Reducing the unfunded liability
  - Increase the fund ratio of the entire pension system
- > 30 year Transfer

# PBA/FMBA Pension Proposal

- Transfer Management of PFRS
- Labor Management Board
  - > 7 Labor Representatives
  - > 5 Management Representatives
- Responsible for Proper Operation of the PFRS

### PBA/FMBA Proposal

- > THE BOARD MAY, IN ITS DISCRETION AND AT SUCH TIME AND A MANNER, AS IT DETERMINES:
  - ► Enhance any benefit set forth in N.J.S.A. 43:16A-1 et seq.; or
  - Modify any such benefit as an alternative to an increase in the member contribution rate; or
  - > Reinstate, when appropriate, such reduced benefit to the statutory level without an additional contribution by the member.
